

Hence it calls for a rigorous study of language and literature produced or translated into English language. The mission is to expose the students to some of the best forms of literary writing across cultures and communities, past and present. The department will provide students with a coherent curricular framework and relevant well-structured choices that will foster linguistic competency and critical thinking.

History and Prominence of the Department:

The department was established in 2006 along with the University. The founder Vice Chancellor of the University Prof. K. Nirupa Rani was a professor of English from Andhra University, Visakhapatnam. She took keen interest in developing the department and under her scholarly guidance the department had been offering courses of language and literature. A well-equipped dedicated computer lab was established in 2006 to promote LSRW skills among the students.

Ours is the first department to start class work on this campus in 2010 in a temporary shed. The faculty and students cooperated to participate in the teaching learning activities in the open natural wilderness of the then campus. From the beginning the department has been innovative in designing and offering the most contemporary topics/courses like semiotics, discourse analysis, introduction to literature, environmental literature and an ELT course in every semester. Program Outcome:

At the end of the course the student will be introduced to the literatures produced in English and translated into English. Making British Literature the foundation in the first two semesters, the program diversifies into literatures produced in many English speaking cultures. The student will be exposed to a diverse range of critical/theoretical texts, from Euro-American, African and Indian critical traditions that arose from specific socio-economic, linguistic, philosophical theories. The program equips the student with essential critical tools to comprehend literature in particular, and culture in general. Also, the program will expose to student to environmental issues through written and audio visual texts. In addition, the program trains the student in English Language Teaching for professional application.

Department Library:

The main objective of the Department Library is to collect, organize and disseminate books and other related documents relevant to the academic and research needs of the students. To realize this objective, the department procures reading materials, books through donations and organizes them through genre classification on the shelves for the benefit of the students. With 857 titles the Department Library remains as a resource center for academic and research activities in the areas of language teaching, linguistics and literatures in English. Library books and other reading materials are adequately secured through glass shelves. Books are given on loan to student users for photocopying, reference, and reading.
